GIS members attend Civil War Ceremony

On January 25, 1865 members of the 5th U.S. Colored Cavalry were attacked near Simpsonville by Confederate guerillas. The encounter, called the "Simpsonville Slaughter," left over 20 dead and at least that many wounded. Nearly all of these soldiers were former slaves. The dead were buried in an unmarked grave. A road side marker was dedicated at the ceremony.
