### 1812 Patriot Grave Ceremony (Mt. Sterling, KY)

# Samuel Luttrell Williams 1781-1872

A tailor by trade, a patriot called to arms, a farmer, and a legislator. Samuel L. Williams was born in Northumberland County, VA, the son of Revolutionary War soldier Rawleigh Williams and Rebecca Luttrell. The family settled in what is now Montgomery County in 1792. He was commissioned as the Captain of the 5th Regiment on August 7, 1812 and led a company of 83 men, including his younger brother Thaddeus, from this county to the Battle of River Raisin in Michigan. Following his capture and parole, he returned to Montgomery County where he and his wife Fanny Cluke raised their large family of twelve children. He took an active part in community and state affairs. He represented Montgomery County in the State House of Representatives in 1814 and 1818, and was sent to the Kentucky Senate from 1820-24, 1828-32, and 1840-1844. He attained the rank of General while serving in the State Militia. Williams died on his farm at the age of 91.
